I would like to share a couple of technical hints as you watch the video.....

- 1. Enlarging your picture...There is a small broken box symbol at the bottom right of the screen. If you hit this with your cursor by using your mouse or touching it on the I Pad it will expand the picture to full screen.
- 2. At the end of the video you will need to reduce the size of your screen. Depending on your equipment you may have to tap that broken box symbol again to reduce the screen or if you see three dots at the top right of your screen tap the symbol and one of the options that will come up says "open in new window". If you select this it will allow you to reduce the screen.
- 3. The reason for a reduced screen at the end allows you to have access to the comments area where you can write questions.
- 4. If you find this complicated just leave your screen at the reduced size throughout the video and ignore 1,2 and 3 above.
